Every once in a while, a group of like-minded artists come together and shake things up. They become the catalyst of something special, pushing the boundaries of creativity and taking their chosen art form to new places and new heights. A decade ago, just such a moment occurred with the birth of the Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble. The only contemporary classical music repertoire ensemble in Northern Ireland, Hard Rain's championing of innovative New Music is acknowledged as pioneering on these islands. Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble is Northern Ireland's contemporary music group. Now, with over a decade of performing experience and increasing international engagements, Hard Rain remains committed to giving a voice to local composers and performing their music in the context of the leading exponents of contemporary music worldwide. It aims to programme music that otherwise cannot be heard live locally, while serving as an outlet for the talent of highly specialist

performers and acting as a meeting point for their innovation, ideas and enthusiasm. Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble's incredible lineup of musicians make the performance of contemporary music a central aspect of their creative lives. HRSE are ensemble in residence at Queen's University Belfast and are based at the Sonic Arts Research Centre QUB, a state of the art facility opened by Karlheinz Stockhausen in 2004.

We thank Greg for his tireless efforts in getting Hard Rain off the ground, making lasting connections, creating countless concerts and establishing the solid foundations of our ensemble. Most of all, we thank him for his unending faith in us as musicians and his brave programming choices. We will make sure to carry on with his 'nothing can go wrong' attitude.

Behind the scenes Hard Rain operates as a close–knit chamber ensemble that shares a spirit for discovery and exploration. We have grown and developed, we have inspired each other, and we have learned much from listening to each other carefully over 10 years. We've been privileged to work closely with some wonderful collaborators and composers, and we look forward to much more of that

Hard Rain will take courage for the next chapter in thinking how far we have come, and how we have helped set the groundwork for a network of new music in Belfast. We have formed a firm base here, and we are privileged to have such a wonderful home in QUB. As always, we are excited by our involvement within the University. But in addition, we have established and nurtured the new music scene and become an important part of the musical fabric of this island. In many ways we are proud to be the go-to ensemble for many of Ireland's greatest composers.

And so the adventures continue...

We start our Season with a concert of connections. We open with a work by our featured composer, which was written during our first season, and close with a newly composed work by Raymond Deane, dedicated to Greg Caffrey. In between, we feature the music of friends: Ryan Molloy, who has both composed and performed with Hard Rain, Anita Mawhinney with her third work for the group and Sungji Hong who we were delighted to host last year. We also showcase two upcoming composers: Sarah Colgan's piece was selected as a highlight from our QUB industry professional workshops last year and Samuel Kane, a previous PRSf composer and now one of our Featured Young Artists of 23/24.

The natural world beckons for our second concert. The planet and world around us can be a source of inspiration for many musicians and composers and with ever-growing environmental concerns coming to light in increasingly disturbing ways, it feels very timely to highlight and reflect on this. This

is a truly international programme featuring Joan Tower, Judith Weir, Tansy Davies and Toru Takemitsu to name but a few. We have a live premiere performance from our Featured Composer which also includes our Young Artist harpist Rosie Murphy and we look forward to welcoming Jonathan Mann as guest conductor for the first time.

In the new year we have our annual Ink Still Wet concert which showcases brand new works and no less than eight world premieres. including those commissioned through our PRSf Talent Development Partnership from early career composers Rebecca Doherty. Orly Watson and Sarah Colgan. We are also very excited for the return of the Peter Rosser Award, here in it's sixth edition, which will showcase three finalists and offer the audience a chance to vote for their favourite work. Bookending the concert are two world premieres from highly experienced local composers, Matthew Whiteside and Stephen Gardner, and these will feature guest conductor Paul McCusker at the helm.

We promote the talents of this year's
Featured Young Artists, violinist Samuel Kane
and harpist Rosie Murphy, in a QUB Lunchtime
Recital. Sam and Rosie, will demonstrate
their incredible talents in this beautifully
chosen programme, which places their own
compositions alongside local composer Greg
Caffrey and international counterparts Nenad
Firšt, Naji Hakim and Arvo Pärt.





SEASON AT A GLANCE

We celebrate International Women's Day with works which exclusively include electronics. Another international selection, with New York residents Anna Clyne and Missy Mazzoli, this concert also features composers well known to the ensemble such as Elaine Agnew and Deirdre Gribben, and we pay particular homage to Kaija Saariaho who sadly passed away in 2023. From conflict and protest pieces to ambient late night atmosphere, this concert is a true exploration of live music with electronics.

We look forward to working with the Ulster Youth Orchestra once more and featuring two American contemporary greats: **George Lewis** and **Terry Riley**. We welcome **Paul Hoskins**, Director of Music at the Purcell School, to lead and conduct this workshop and concert, such a great opportunity for some of our most talented young musicians.

A highlight of our season will be the Gallery Music events for which we make a welcome return to the beautiful Hugh Lane Gallery in Dublin. We also take up residency for a day in the amazing **Ulster Museum**. The concert includes music inspired by the visual arts including Greg Caffrey's 3 movements on the work of William Scott which hangs in the museum. We carry on the American connection with music by John Luther Adams, Perry Goldstein and Jane O'Leary. There is a world premiere by local rising star Amelia Clarkson and an incredibly atmospheric piece by Anna Thorvaldsdottir to finish, perfect for the amazing acoustics of the gallery. We also mark this special collaboration with the Ulster Museum in featuring short solos from various spaces within the museum every hour for the whole day.

As always, the thank yous are so very important, the most important of which goes to our principal funder the Arts Council Northern Ireland for supporting the many strands of our work. As mentioned, we are grateful to Queen's University School of Arts, English and Languages for adopting us as their resident ensemble, allowing us to situate ourselves in their vibrant environment with access to wonderful facilities, and above all world class venues. Thanks also to **PRS Foundation**, whose funding supports our early career initiatives, and we see that as something which helps future proof the creative environment going forward. Most of all we thank both our long-standing and new friends of the ensemble and our amazing thrill-seeking audience who take this journey with us and never fail in their enthusiasm and support for what we do.

Needless to say, I'm looking forward with the greatest excitement to this upcoming season.

This concert celebrates our ongoing connections with local and international composers and begins as we mean to continue, with several premieres. We performed Unrest by Greg Caffrey in our first season and so it feels fitting to revisit this at the beginning of our new decade, especially as we close the concert with a new work by Raymond Deane, widely considered one of Ireland's most prominent composers. Skew Weft is a recent Arts Council of Ireland commission and is dedicated to Greg.

We showcase two upcoming composers: Sarah Colgan whose Demonic Dances was selected from our QUB residence last year, and the beautifully atmospheric Elatha's Ascension by Samuel Kane. Sam was a PRSf composer of 22/23 and now as one of our Featured Young Artists of 23/24, we're delighted to welcome Sam to join us on stage for this performance.

We also build upon our existing connections with works by composers who are becoming well known to Hard Rain audiences: Sungji Hong who joined us last season from USA and her most recent piece Eplisthisan, Anita Mawhinney with a world premiere of Macalla Mhacha, her third work for Hard Rain, and Ryan Molloy who composed a solo bass clarinet piece, Amhrán Fheilimidh, for our own Sarah Watts.

The natural world is the source of inspiration behind this concert. Highlighting our environment with music inspired by our planet, the places and nature within, this is a worldwide programme that showcases and connects some of the finest international contemporary composers alongside well–known local composers.

There are some folk-inspired themes; there is a suggestion of Scottish fiddle tunes in **Judith Weir**'s *Blue-green hill*, and an expression of longing in **Áine Mallon**'s *Callan*, inspired by the river Callan in Co. Armagh. And water continues to flow through this programme, from the Brazilian river of **Joan Tower**'s *Amazon* to the sea of **Toru Takemitsu**'s striking imagery. It is also present in *Undertow* by **Tansy Davies**:

"Exploring the elemental mechanisms of the natural world, exploring the psychological devastation of global events, exploring the most intimate aspects of body and heart and head. Tansy's music lets us feel what it is to be multiform and nimble, intense and enlivened, confrontational and beautiful." Kate Molleson

We close the concert with the first live concert performance of **Greg Caffrey**'s *Seul sous la grande indifference du ciel*. Composed in 2020 for the Fews Ensemble while reflecting upon the pandemic, the piece is in two movements; the first is dedicated to Maurice Rayel and the second to Albert Camus:

"Thus each of us had to be content to live only for the day, alone under the vast indifference of the sky"

With no fewer than eight world premieres, Ink Still Wet remains our most exciting vision of new music. As talent development partners with **PRSf**, Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble are able to fund three early stage career NI composers to write for the ensemble and they also benefit from workshops with the ensemble, discussions with our conductor, and mentorship from more senior composers.

We also greatly welcome the return of the **Peter Rosser prize**, this year in its sixth edition. With previous prize-winners now forging successful careers, this competition is a great opportunity to witness first-hand the future of Irish contemporary music.

Bookending our programme are two commissions from Northern Irish composers: a first Hard Rain performance for **Matthew Whiteside** and a return to the uniquely visceral music of **Stephen Gardner** with a new Arts Council Ireland commission. Not to be missed.

We feature the legendary Finnish composer **Kaija Saariaho**, one of the greats of contemporary music who sadly passed away earlier this year. Her masterpiece for flute *NoaNoa* refers to woodcuts made by Paul Gauguin after his return to Paris from Tahiti.

As always, younger composers are included and we give the Irish premiere of Polish composer **Oktawia Pączkowska**'s not an ideology. This is a protest piece which, in using quoted statements from the far right government, seeks to highlight and question the inequality and underlying homophobia present in modern day society.

We feature three of our finest Irish composers: Linda Buckley who depicts the snowy silences of Alaska, Deirdre Gribben's piano piece featuring the dawn prayer ritual of an exiled Tibetan monk, and Elaine Agnew's work for the Aftermath project with an accompanying voice track of victims, survivors and displaced families affected by conflict.

We also feature two New York based composers here: Anna Clyne, whose tape part "comprises a melody and winding sounds from a music box that my father gave my mother in their early days of courting, and the sounds of the carousel and pebbles at Brighton Beach in the South of England—a place of fond memories" and Missy Mazzoli, whose piece is a short but intense response to the following text by Stephen Crane:

Yes, I have a thousand tongues, And nine and ninety-nine lie. Though I strive to use the one, It will make no melody at my will, But is dead in my mouth.

Join us for our annual joint concert with the talented musicians of the Ulster Youth Orchestra. This year we have guest conductor Paul Hoskins, visiting from the Purcell School of Music and we mark the occasion by featuring music by two giants of American contemporary music, George Lewis and Terry Riley. Our afternoon workshop (not open to the public) is an exciting chance for the young musicians of UYO to explore contemporary music, investigate new sounds and techniques within a larger ensemble setting.

George Lewis piece Arcades is essentially a group improvisation and "as the musicians navigate through the written passages that make up the sonic arcades, the overall effect should be that of several different kinds of musical behaviours heard in juxtaposition, but with a certain common direction. The players feel their way through the piece from beginning to end, establishing and re-establishing consensus—an emergent sonic sociality, or perhaps a protean assemblage." (CoMA).

"Terry Riley's piece In C is one of the seminal works of the late 20th century. Premiered in 1964, it was the work that introduced the musical style now known as Minimalism to a mainstream audience. Full of repeating cells, insistent rhythms, and high energy, In C is a work that can also be endlessly colourful... In C had a deep and lasting impact on contemporary classical composers like Steve Reich and John Adams; but it also affected the rock world, influencing artists like John Cale and Brian Eno." Largely inspired by the visual arts, this programme highlights music which encourages us to consider and imagine various visual elements. William Scott, whose works hang in the Ulster Museum, is the focus for our Featured Composer Greg Caffrey and we also premiere a recent work by Amelia Clarkson, an upcoming local composer formerly supported by our PRSf scheme.

There is an American connection between Perry Goldstein, whose piece Twittering Machine was inspired by Paul Klee's painting, Jane O'Leary, with her atmospheric vision of Gwen O'Dowd's abstract sea paintings and John Luther Adams The Light Within. He describes the inspiration behind the piece "On a crisp autumn day sitting inside Meeting -Turrell's skyspace at PS1 in Queens, New York -I experienced my own epiphany of light. From mid-afternoon through sunset into night, I was transfixed by the magical interplay of light and colour, above and within. Over the hours the sky descended through every nameless shade of blue, to heaviest black. The light within the space rose from softest white, through ineffable yellow to deepest orange. Just after sunset there came a moment when outside and inside met in perfect equipoise. The midnight blue of the sky and the burnished peach of the room came together, fusing into one vibrant yet intangible plane...light becoming colour, becoming substance."

The spacious and thoughtful atmosphere of this work carries through to the end of the concert with a work by Icelandic composer Anna Thorvaldsdottir, whose "musical material is constructed with a focus on subtle nuances and poetic textures...". Her score is imbued with beauty and fragility and performance directions such as "Soloistic with calm & ease and subtle sense of brokenness" complete our transcendence into ambient artistry.

Aisling's involvement in Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble reflects her continued passion for new music and working with composers. She has premiered and recorded many contemporary works for flute and highlights include performing for Sir Peter Maxwell Davies 80th birthday concert and giving the first performance in Scotland of Penderecki's Flute Concerto. Aisling regularly performs with various orchestras in the UK and Ireland, she is a founding member of the Irish Memory Orchestra and she also

Irish conductor Sinead Hayes is a Britten Pears Artist for 2023/24. A graduate of the masters conducting programme of the Royal Northern College of Music, Manchester, she is emerging as a leading interpreter of contemporary music and opera in Ireland. The 2023-24 season is Sinead's tenth season as conductor of the Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble in Belfast, with whom she has premiered numerous works by established Irish and international composers. She has conducted all the major professional orchestras in Ireland including the Ulster Orchestra, RTE Concert Orchestra and Irish Chamber Orchestra, as well as conducting productions for Northern Ireland Opera, Irish National Opera and Opera Collective Ireland.

Recent projects include conducting the world premiere of Ian Wilson's Passerine Night with the Fews Ensemble, the broadcast of Elaine Agnew's opera Paper Boat for RTE Lyric FM, concerts with Wexford Sinfonia, Limerick Philharmonic and the Luminosa String Orchestra as well as the creation of an audio piece documenting the work of Anthony Braxton at the Darmstadt Summer Course 2023. This season she returns to Wexford Sinfonia and Limerick Philharmonic. as well as making her Ulster Hall debut conducting the Irish Doctor's Orchestra. She will work for a third season as conductor of the Royal Irish Academy Symphony Orchestra, and looks forward to sharing new approaches on creative music making and conducted improvisation, inspired by her experiences at Darmstadt 2023.

David McCann has worked with many of the U.K. and Ireland's leading orchestras, including the Hallé Orchestra, the BBC Philharmonic Orchestra, Manchester Camerata, the Ulster Orchestra, the RTÉ Concert Orchestra, Ireland's National Symphony Orchestra, the Orchestra of Opera North and Northern Ireland Opera. He also enjoys playing chamber music; in addition to his role as HRSE's cellist he performs regularly with Newry Chamber Music's Fews Ensemble, and in 2017 he performed George Crumb's Vox Balaenae in the closing concert of the Salisbury International Arts Festival.

A passionate interpreter of new music, David has given premiere performances of dozens of new pieces for his instrument. He is also active as a composer; in 2017 he was commissioned by HRSE to compose Three Caprices for solo cello. His Six Pieces for solo flute and Suite for solo cello received first performances in 2019, and his *Reflexion* for solo cello was premiered in 2022. David graduated from the Royal Northern College of Music in 2010 and completed the MMus course with distinction in 2012. He teaches privately at his home in Belfast.

Daniel Browell enjoys a busy and varied performing career, having given recitals in the UK, Europe, China and North America. His debut recital at London's Purcell Room in the Southbank Centre and concerto performance at Manchester's Bridgewater Hall received critical acclaim in the national press. Daniel particularly enjoys collaborative projects with instrumentalists and singers in addition to his work with the Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble; he has performed with YCAT winner Kathryn Rudge at the Wigmore Hall and on many occasions since, and he has worked with the BBC Philharmonic on numerous occasions, including performing in the orchestra's chamber music series in Salford. Other recent engagements have included projects with the Ulster Orchestra and Birmingham Contemporary Music Group.

After studying for his undergraduate degree at the University of Birmingham, Daniel went on to study in Paris, London (Royal Academy of Music) and Chicago. Whilst then going on to become a Junior Fellow at the Royal Northern College of Music, he won numerous prizes and awards. Daniel is in great demand as a teacher; he has given masterclasses and has taught in China, Europe, the Middle East and America, and is highly regarded as an adjudicator. He was appointed Associate Head of Keyboard at the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire in 2014 and is currently a member of the jury and organising committee of the Dudley International Piano Competition.

Sarah performs extensively with SCAW (bass clarinet and piano duo) and rarescale (low flutes and clarinets). She has completed a PHD exploring bass clarinet multiphonics and published a book on the subject. Sarah is an Henri Selmer Paris artist, Vandoren Artist, and a Silverstein pro artist.

PAUL HOSKINS

Paul Hoskins is Director of Music at the Purcell School, where he manages the artistic programme and a department of over 60 specialist music teachers, educating the next generation of young musicians.

Until 2018, he was Music Director of world renowned dance company Rambert, where In 2009 he devised the innovative and hugely successful Rambert Music Fellowship, to encourage young composers to write for dance. Other significant Rambert projects included *Life is a Dream*, set to symphonic works by Lutoslawski, at the 2018 Bergen International Festival; a choreographed production of Haydn's Creation at Sadler's Wells with the BBC Singers; Mahler and Dance at the Edinburgh International Festival, with Jane Irwin and Gerard Finley; and CDs of contemporary music for NMC Records. Paul has been responsible for dozens of acclaimed commissions and world premieres.

As guest conductor, Paul has worked with many of the world's major ballet companies, and in concerts with symphony orchestras in the UK, Europe and America. He has conducted Don Giovanni with Roderick Williams, The Magic Flute, the world premiere of Stephen McNeff's Clockwork at the Royal Opera House, and less well known classical opera at the Buxton Festival. He has assisted at Glyndebourne and English National Opera, working closely with Mark Wigglesworth. Paul Hoskins studied French, German and Music at Cambridge University, and conducting at the Royal College of Music, and at summer courses in Siena and Dartington.



JONATHAN MANN

Hailed by Bernard Haitink for the "infectious joy in his conducting and music making", British conductor Jonathan Mann is currently Music Director of UK based Ensemble Cambrica (formerly Cardiff Sinfonietta), an exciting new orchestra aimed at reaching the community in innovative ways. He has conducted broadcasts for the BBC and S4C and worked with soloists including Nicola Benedetti, Dame Evelyn Glennie, Benjamin Grosvenor, Sunwook Kim and Dennis O'Neill.

Highlights this season include his South Korean debut with the Seongnam Philharmonic Orchestra (Seoul) and world premiere performances of the ballet White Doves in Belfast with Six Dance Collective.

Jonathan is increasingly in demand as a teacher of conducting through his role as Artistic Director of the CIAC Conducting Academy, recently collaborating with the Ulster Orchestra, English Symphony Orchestra and NEW Sinfonia. From 2015 – 2022 he was Artistic Director of the Immanuel Orchestra in Bangkok, Thailand which is modeled on the renowned Venezuelan music program 'El Sistema'.

Jonathan Mann studied in London at the Royal Academy of Music and Guildhall School of Music and Drama. He was a prize winner at the Jeunesses Musicales International Conducting Competition in Bucharest, as well as the Sir Charles Mackerras Junior Fellow in Conducting at Trinity Laban Conservatoire of Music and Dance. His conducting mentors are Colin Metters, George Hurst, Jac Van Steen and Bernard Haitink.



PAUL MCCUSKER


Paul began studying music when he took up the violin and piano at the age of seven. Following school, he opted to study zoology at Queen's University Belfast (QUB), but while there he became heavily involved in the musical life of the university, conducting the Music Society Choir and then the QUB Symphony Orchestra.

Having completed his PhD in molecular parasitology in 2014, Paul worked as a postdoctoral researcher in the School of Biological Sciences at QUB before leaving in 2017 to study conducting at the Royal Conservatoire of Scotland with Garry Walker and Alasdair Mitchell. There, he won the Hugh S Roberton prize for orchestral conducting, participated in a workshop with the Royal Scottish National Orchestra and conducted the Red Note Ensemble in concert.

In March 2018 he won the panel and orchestra prizes at the Feis Ceoil Conducting Competition with the RTE Concert Orchestra, which led to a lunchtime concert performance with the orchestra. He has subsequently conducted the Ulster Orchestra, Ulster Youth Orchestra and Esker Festival Orchestra as well as founding/directing Laganside Sinfonia, a Belfast based charity orchestra that has raised around £20.000 for local charities since its establishment. While working as a postdoctoral researcher at the Medical College of Wisconsin, USA (2018 - 2020), he established an orchestra before returning to QUB in 2020. In recent years Paul has studied with Garry Walker, David Brophy and Jac van Steen.

FEATURED YOUNG ARTISTS

Each year we invite applicants from Ulster Youth Orchestra (including recent UYO alumni) to audition for our Young Artist scheme. Our chosen artist/s receives specialist coaching in contemporary chamber music through participation in rehearsals, workshops and professional experience in concerts.







SAMUEL KANE Violin

From County Armagh, Sam grew up with a love for classical and traditional music. He won the NI Young Musician of the Year award before moving to Manchester where he studied violin with Cecily Ward at the Royal Northern College of Music, and was awarded the RNCM Norman George violin prize. Sam led the Ulster Youth Orchestra, and has played with the Ulster Orchestra and Manchester Camerata.

As a soloist Sam performed Bruch's 1st violin concerto with the Manchester Beethoven Orchestra as well as playing recitals for Festivals such as Clandeboye, Charles Wood, Enys, Blackwater Valley Opera, Belfast International Music Festival, and Harp Ireland alongside Rosie Murphy. Sam has worked in masterclass with violinists James Enhes, Yair Kless, Flina Vähälä, Yossi Zivoni and Bettina Mussumeli during his time at RNCM, and has also received composition lessons from Caroline Shaw. Passionate about composing and performing new music, Sam was supported by the PRS early career commission scheme to compose a piece for the Hard Rain Soloist Ensemble for their 2022/23 season.

Sam has performed at the Wigmore Hall, London and his compositions have been broadcast on BBC Radio Ulster and Classic FM, winning Classic FM's 'Big Platinum Performance' prize. He is currently a final year MMus student at the RNCM, where he is supported by the Irish Heritage Homman Potterton Bursary and a Help Musicians Postgraduate Award.



ROSIE MURPHY Harp

Rosie Murphy is a harpist and composer currently studying classical music and sonology in The Hague Royal Conservatory. She has also received a diploma of higher music from The Guildhall School of Music and Drama, London. Rosie has performed recitals of her own music in Áras an Uachtaráin, No. 10 Downing Street, The Lyric Theatre Belfast, The London Irish Centre and the Sonic Arts Research Centre. She was selected as Music Network's 2022 Emerging Musician-in-Residence in Dun Laoghaire-Rathdown and In 2021, she composed a work inspired by Irish mythology for 21 Artists for the 21st century.

This summer Rosie made her debut as a soloist, playing Handel's Harp Concerto with the Irish Youth Baroque Orchestra, which was performed in St. Annes Church and recorded in The National Concert Hall. She was principal harp with the Ulster Youth Orchestra in 2021/22 and in 2023, was principal harp in the Esker Festival Orchestra. Rosie has a keen interest in performing contemporary music and newly composed works, recently performing a work by Phillipe Hersant which was subsequently broadcast on Dutch radio. Rosie premiered new works in the composition festival in the Hague in May 2023 and is an awardee of the 2022 Music Capital Scheme. She is delighted to be a Featured Young Artist for The Hard Rain Soloist ensemble for 2023/2024!

Composer

The Irish composer Greg Caffrey read music at Queen's University Belfast where he studied composition under Prof. Piers Hellawell and complexist composer James Clarke, completing a PhD in 2002. Numerous awards for composition include: First Prize at the Concorso Counterpoint, Italy in May 2012, finalist in the ISME- IVME 2nd International Composition Contest in Brussels in 2008, at the Taukay Edizioni Musicali International Composition Prize in 2012 and the Musica Domani International Composition Prize (USA). His recent orchestral work A Terrible Beauty was designated a "recommended work" in the 4th Uuno Klami International Composition Prize by a jury which included Magnus Lindberg and Erkki-Sven Tüür and Environments II for guitar and orchestra was a prizewinning work in the chamber orchestra music category of the International Conductors Union Composition Contest, Ukraine in 2021. His work ... for peace comes dropping slow was selected by the international jury to represent Ireland at ISCM World Music Days in China 2021. Recently he was awarded the Major Individual Award. This award is the highest value honour bestowed by ACNI on artists. Greg is additionally the recipient of the prestigious PRSf 2022 Composers Award.




Greg Caffrey, Composer

ORLY WATSON

Orly Watson is a pianist, organist, and composer. He read Music at Somerville College, Oxford and studied the piano with Michael Dussek at the Royal Academy of Music in London. He is Official Accompanist at Queen's University Belfast where he is also a PhD researcher and teaching assistant. He is active as an operatic répétiteur and has worked closely with Ulster Touring Opera since its formation.

He coordinates an organ recital series and spent more than six years as Organist and Director of Music at Dromore Cathedral. His doctoral research examines the role and potentiality of reconsidered Romantic aesthetics in contemporary composition and places a particular emphasis on the influence of Irish landscape and folklore. His recently-composed cycle of Eight Pieces on Irish Hymn Tunes has been published in the UK and performed in leading venues, and has been described as "one of the finest Irish contributions to the organ repertoire. A future classic for the modern organist, as starkly original as it is fascinating."



SARAH COLGAN

Sarah Colgan has recently completed her Bachelor of Music degree (BMus) at Queen's University Belfast. Originally from Loughinisland, County Down, Sarah went to St. Macartan's primary school, and Down High School, where she found a real love for music, participating in numerous performances.

More recently, at Queen's her interest in composition has flourished under the guidance of Piers Hellawell, and Simon Mawhinney. During her time at Queen's, she has had the opportunity to compose solo pieces for bassoon, clarinet, and cello, as well as for trios (flute, clarinet, and violin) and quintet (flute, clarinet, violin, cello, and piano). Through workshop collaborations with Hard Rain SoloistEnsemble, she gained invaluable experience, and is currently pursuing as many opportunities as possible to develop her compositional practice.




REBECCA DOHERTY

Working with the Ulster Youth Orchestra



HRSE COMMISSIONS & BESPOKE MUSIC

Two newly composed works, for Hard Rain, have been initiated thanks to funding from **Arts Council of Ireland**. These two commissions are for the full ensemble and include a new work from Raymond Deane entitled *Skew Weft* and *The Tyranny of Time* by Stephen Gardner. We're very excited to be collaborating with both and giving the premieres of these works during our 23/24 season.

We premiere a new work Macalla Mhacha by Anita Mawhinney. This forms the second part of a two-part project and, composed with funding from the Arts Council of Northern Ireland, is based on Macha from Celtic mythology. Matthew Whiteside also features in our premiere performances this year with his new piece Into Light, Being commissioned with funds from the Hope Scott Trust.

As always, we present our three early career composers' works funded through our PRSf Talent Development Partnership. This was initiated through a competitive call for smaller works and this year they were awarded to Sarah Colgan, Rebecca Doherty and Orly Watson. We also feature two new works from our Young Artists Rosie Murphy and Samuel Kane, both receiving their premiere performances this season.

Previous HRSE commissions will receive continued exposure this year such as Jane O'Leary's, *Beneath the dark blue waves* and we're delighted to give the first *live* concert performance of *Seul sous la grande indifference du ciel* by Greg Caffrey, composed with funding from the **Arts Council of Northern Ireland**.


